SCRIPTURE THIS WEEK:

John 12:1-11

¹ Six days before the Passover, Jesus therefore came to Bethany, where Lazarus was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. ² So they gave a dinner for him there. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those reclining with him at table. ³ Mary therefore took a pound of expensive ointment made from pure nard, and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. ⁴ But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was about to betray him), said, ⁵ "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" ⁶ He said this, not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief, and having charge of the moneybag he used to help himself to what was put into it. ⁷ Jesus said, "Leave her alone, so that she may keep it for the day of my burial. ⁸ For the poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me." ⁹ When the large crowd of the Jews learned that Jesus was there, they came, not only on account of him but also to see Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. ¹⁰ So the chief priests made plans to put Lazarus to death as well, ¹¹ because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus.

Life Group Discussion Questions

John 12:1-11

For the week of October 2, 2022

Reading the Text:

1. In your own words, how would you articulate the big idea of this passage?
2. Knowing what John tells us about Judas in this story, what are we to understand about the motives behind Judas' interaction at the party?
3. Was it (and is it currently) common for a woman to wash someone's feet with her hair? Why or why not? Additionally, if a denarius is known to be about a day's wage, and 300 denarii translates to about a year's wages, what can we gather about Mary's sacrifice?
4. What is the biggest contrast in this passage? What was at the core of Judas' interaction? What was at the core of Mary's interaction?

Living it Out:

5. Three hundred denarii is equivalent to about a year's wages. What would a comparable sacrifice be in today's terms?
6. Judas eventually sold Jesus out for 30 pieces of silver, which many historians believe is equivalent to about \$250 in today's economy. What strikes you about the differences between the ways Judas and Mary ascribed value to Jesus?
7. Jesus spent a great amount of time warning about the pitfalls of money. Is money itself bad? Why or why not? In what ways can we assess our treasures by the way we use our money and resources (time, talents, and treasures)?
