Digging into the Text

- 4. Read 1 Corinthians 3:18-23 and respond:
- In v. 18, explain what Paul means by the statement "let him become a fool that he may become wise." How is self-deception at the core of people's wrong thinking?
- How is God's wisdom different than worldly wisdom?
- Why does Paul not want the Corinthians (or us) to boast in men in v. 21?
- How does realizing that "all things" are ours as Christians help solve the problem that the Corinthians were having of elevating humans too much?
- Summarize what the author is saying in this text.

Applying It to My Life

- 5. Is there an area of your life where you'd recognize that you're prone to self-deception?
- 6. Who are the people in your life who you allow to call you out if they see you going astray?
- 7. How can the group be praying for you as we all desire to grow in more fully realizing and appreciating all that we have in Christ?
