- A note or footnote tells us "The earliest manuscripts do not include 7:53 – 8:11"
- What does that mean exactly?





- Begins in the Book of Acts
- The Church is growing, expanding
- Pentecost the stories and teachings of Jesus are going everywhere



- Being written down Mark (Peter), Luke (Eyewitnesses), Matthew, and John
- Paul is writing letters to churches all over
- His letters are being copied and distributed throughout the Roman world



- The Roman emperors do not like this
- Christians are not honoring the Roman gods
- Paul is executed by Nero in 67AD



- By 100AD all the Apostles are dead, and it's up to their disciples to pass on the true stories
- By 200AD there is general agreement on the true stories, teaching of Jesus – a canon
- By 300AD Roman Emperor Diocletian is determined to wipe out Christianity




- Burning churches, holy books, writings and any Christians who will not recant.

- When Emperor Constantine ends the persecution of Christians (313AD) demand for writings skyrockets





- Byzantine family (Ephesus) is huge and widespread – the Majority Text
- Erasmus 1516 creates first scholarly edition of the Greek New Testament – almost all from Byzantine family, 12<sup>th</sup> Century
- 1611 King James commissions an English version of the Bible same sources



- Fast forward 200 years to the 1800-1900s
- The British Empire spreads across the world
- They are finding more and more of the New Testament and older versions from the other text families



- Suddenly we learn Byzantine text family had some unique features
  - The Lord's Prayer 'For thine is the Kingdom and the Power...'
  - A longer ending to Mark's gospel
  - The Woman Caught in Adultery



- So, did it really happen?

Luke 21:37 – "And every day he was teaching in the temple, but at night he went out and lodged on the mount called Olivet. And early in the morning all the people came to him in the temple to hear him."



**Luke 11:53 – "**The scribes and Pharisees began to press him hard and to provoke him to speak about many things, lying in wait for him, to catch him in something he might say."



Matthew 22:15— "Then the Pharisees went and plotted how to entangle him in his words...Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar, or not?"



Mark 12:18 - "The Sadducees came to Jesus...they asked him a question, saying, 'Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies and leaves a wife, but leaves no child, the man must take the widow and raise up offspring for his brother. There were seven brothers..."



John 5:14 – Jesus found him in the temple and said to him, "See, you are well! Sin no more, that nothing worse may happen to you."

# **How Does This Compare?**

- •There are 10 existing manuscripts of Julius Caesar's *Gallic Wars* (written 50BC). All of them date from the tenth century or later (gap~900yrs)
- •Only 2 manuscripts exist for Tacitus' *Histories* and *Annals*, (written 100AD). One from the ninth and one from the eleventh century

## **How Does This Compare?**

- •For the New Testament
  - Over 5,000 Greek manuscripts
  - Over 10,000 Latin manuscripts
  - Over 9,000 other language manuscripts
  - Almost 25,000 copies or partial copies
  - Dating as early as 125AD
  - A gap of only ~60yrs
